

AnimateTV 2009: four new films for broadcast and online

Airing on Channel 4 in November Screening at Tate Modern in early December

"Before words, before rhythm, a mark is the simplest thing we can make to change our reality. I'm thinking of the power of making a mark and how dangerous, and powerful, this is when the mark gathers significance," Sarah Wood.

This year's AnimateTV programme features new works by four outstanding British filmmakers that explore the world through animation, using a variety of techniques to create alternate realities.

Amnesia by **Cordelia Swann** is a fusion of footage taken on a mobile phone with high definition landscape shots, to create a seductive but disorientating narrative and a wry take on daytime television and classic Hollywood movies.

For Cultural Purposes Only by **Sarah Wood** is an experimental film essay investigating the cultural importance of cinema. Palestinian filmmakers describe scenes of important films, once held in the Palestinian film archive that were

destroyed in the siege of Beirut in 1982, that are then re-drawn by illustrator Woodrow Phoenix.

Tad's Nest by **Petra Freeman** presents a darkly evocative fairytale exploring the memory of sensation. This distinctive work is painted on glass then layered digitally, accompanied by the dramatic, mystical yet tactile sounds of Russian composer Sofia Gubaidulina.

Unicycle Film by **Thomas Hicks** combines stop-frame animation using actors in a carefully choreographed performance on unicycles, scrolling hand painted backgrounds and hand-drawn flipbooks, to create a fantastical film that makes transparent the processes involved.

The AnimateTV programme will be broadcast on Channel 4 in November, where the artists will each give an insight into their films. The films will then be shown on animateprojects.org in December, alongside contextualising information - artist interviews, test footage and background materials.

About the artists:

Cordelia Swann - Amnesia

Amnesia opens with the heroine waking up in a beach house in Malibu to find that her husband is Pierce Brosnan. He hands her a camera phone in the hope that its images will help her piece together her past life... With allusions to made-for-TV movies and classic Hollywood films, especially Rebecca, the voiceover story of Amnesia will unravel - exploiting the innate possibilities that exist in dreams, memory and implausible plots of daytime television.

Born in San Francisco and brought up in Manhattan, Cordelia has lived the greater part of her life in London, working as an artist and film curator since 1979. Her filmography includes A Call to Arms, featuring Tilda Swinton (1989), Out West (1992) and Desert Rose (1996).

Sarah Wood - For Cultural Purposes Only

An experimental film essay investigating the cultural importance of cinema. Interviewees describe from memory key moments from films once held in the Palestinian film archive, destroyed in the siege of Beirut in 1982. The scenes are re-drawn from memory, and interspersed with the story of the archive. The archive's loss is measured through the complexity of the reconstruction process.

Sarah is an artist filmmaker and film curator. She has curated for organisations including LUX, The Photographers' Gallery and Cambridge Film Festival and has been the Artists' Film Development Officer at the Independent Cinema Office. Her most recent films are I Want to Be a Secretary (2007), which won the Best Film prize at the London Short Film Festival, Surrender (2005), Manifesto for Love (2003) and Living Space (2003). Illustrator Woodrow Phoenix will be supplying the illustrations in the film. His work includes the strips The Sumo Family, published in the Independent on Sunday, and The Liberty Cat, for Japan's Morning magazine. He has also published two books: Rumble Strip, exploring the psychology of the relationship between people and cars, and Plastic Culture: How Japanese Toys Conquered the World.

Petra Freeman - Tad's Nest

Childhood memories of a secret place are the starting point for a story that evokes the innocent and the sinister. In Tad's Nest, Petra integrates her characteristic oil painting on glass technique with digital images. Tad's Nest explores Petra's synaesthesia, she says, 'Often, spoken and written works cannot define a state of being. I am interested in how we can hold on to a memory over many years. Not only visual memories, but memories of sensation.'

Petra graduated with an MA in Illustration, Royal College of Art in 1990 and has been working as an artist ever since. Her filmography includes The Mill (1992) and Jumping Joan (1994). Her work has shown at numerous exhibitions and screenings, including the National Portrait Gallery, London, the Edinburgh Film Festival and Annecy Animation Festival, France.

Thomas Hicks - Unicycle Film

Two unicyclists carry out a strangely choreographed performance captured in stop motion. Their movements at times mirror each other, at times work together, like one machine, like a heartbeat or a lungs breath. Thomas says of the project, 'I want to mix very traditional animation processes and very theatrical live action with small elements of subtle computer animation - carefully composited to create a richly dark universe.'

Thomas studied illustration and animation at Kingston University. In 2005 he entered a Creative Review/Warp Records commission to make a music video for the band Gravenhurst, and has since created album artwork and directed further videos for the band. This project develops his creative collaboration with the band's singer/songwriter, Nick Talbot. Thomas lives in Kingston, and works as a freelance music video and commercials director through Passion Pictures.

Animate Projects commissions artists to make work that explores the relationship between contemporary art and animation, for broadcast, gallery, cinema and digital exhibition.
